## New Executive Director, New Clinic Director Take Charge

August saw the start of Juan Barajas taking over as Executive Director and Judith Weatherly, MFT stepping into the position of Clinic Director for the Mental Health Clinic. (More about Juan on this page and about Judith and changes in the clinic starting on page 4.)

Our new Executive Director, **Juan Barajas**, brings over five years of non-profit management experience and nearly 10 years of working with the LGBT community to the Pacific Center. With a degree in psychology from Stanford University, Juan has worked with the LGBT community as a health educator, HIV/AIDS outreach worker, and program design consultant. Most notably, he led the development of a Palo Alto based LGBT youth support group into a multi-service LGBT youth organization offering youth groups, counseling, mentoring, leadership training, and advocacy. In just four years, the organization's revenues grew by over 500%, which supported hundreds of youth with high quality services.

Our new Clinic Director, **Judith Weatherly** is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist (MFT) and

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## From the Executive Director

Growing up in a rural Oregon town during the 1980's and 90's, I had little idea that community centers for gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender folks existed or that there were even other gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender people in the world. Sure, I'd seen caricatures of gay people on television shows like *Three's Company* or *Friends*, and I'd heard that San Francisco had a big parade. But, it wasn't part of my everyday reality, which was about fitting in with friends, getting good grades, and dreaming of escaping my farm town for the big city. Had someone told me then that instead of being a psychologist that I would be leading an LGBT organization, I would have never believed it. First of all, what did that mean? There were LGBT organizations? (Remember, I was living in a small farm town in Oregon.) Secondly, how could I be so open about being gay that I would have a professional life devoted to it?

Of course, today I can't imagine any other job or place I'd rather be. Serving as the newest Executive Director for the Pacific Center is both a wonderful gift and a great challenge. Our political landscape is a mix of increasing hostility towards our equality and improved acceptance and awareness of our existence. As a result, leading an LGBT Center in 2005 requires me to be a diplomat, cheerleader, fundraiser, organizer, business manager, counselor, and politician. Those are many hats to wear, all of which are important and necessary.

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The Pacific Center receives its operating funds from private donations, corporate donations, the City of Berkeley, County of Alameda, State of California, Evelyn & Walter Haas, Jr. Fund, San Francisco Foundation, the Horizons Foundation and the Partnership Foundation.

## Center to Launch Diversity Initiative

The Pacific Center is forming a Task Force to develop recommendations to help strengthen the Pacific Center and make it more accessible to the broad spectrum of our community. This Cultural Competency Task Force will look at question such as:

- How can the Center be welcoming to everyone who comes through our doors?
- How can our HIV program be more effective in communities of color?
- What do we need to do to strengthen our youth and peer groups and to build relationships across groups that use the Center?
- How can our clinic interns better reflect the diversity of the community we serve?
- What can we do to grow the Center Board of Director to fully represent the diversity of our community?

These and other questions will be the focus of the new Task Force. We will ask a group of Center users, staff, Board and community members to pose inquiries and develop recommendations that can strengthen the Pacific Center and make us more accessible to the broad spectrum of our community. The Task Force will utilize professional staff from *CompassPoint Nonprofit Services* and will operate over a period of 6 – 12 months. Do you want to be a part of this important work? ## From Board President Katharine Gale

After four years on the board, I am pleased to have been elected as the new Board President. It is a little daunting to follow in the footsteps of Ralph Thomas, our outgoing President, but I am excited to do it at this time when so much is happening at the Center. I wish to thank Ralph for his able leadership during so many years.

Our new Executive Director Juan Barajas and new clinic director Judith Weatherly are bringing great leadership and vision to the Center, while consolidating our current programming. We are thrilled to have them with us. As Juan says in his letter, our programs continue to serve critical needs in the East Bay LGBT community, and to touch the lives of so many people.

But we also face challenges. The recent departure of three board members who raised concerns about the Center's diversity and communication calls upon me and the Board to redouble our efforts to make the Pacific Center welcoming to all. I am committed to following our strategic plan goals to make sure that we are always improving.

To focus our efforts, the Board has adopted a four-pronged work plan for the year. Our energies will be directed to:

**Fundraising:** The Center needs to increase the funds we raise from our community. The Public and Foundation grants we receive are key to our programs, but without individual and corporate donations – funds that come with fewer strings – our core operating functions can't keep pace with our programmatic goals. With Juan's leadership, the Board will be stepping up to raise more money for the Center's needs. I hope we will have your support.

**Board Development:** We need to grow the Board and ensure that it is representative of all of our community. We will be actively recruiting board members who have key skills (accounting, legal, marketing, etc.) and who represent the range of our constituencies, including people of color, trans and bi folks, straight allies and people with disabilities. Please see our recruitment notice on this page.

**Clarify Policies:** We will be clarifying and formalizing some of our policies and procedures at the Center and on the Board over the coming year. Look for new information about peer group partnerships and improved security at the Center.

**Cultural Competency Task Force:** We will be seating a task force of Center users, staff, and community members to look at diversity and cultural competency at all levels in the Center. We will have professional facilitation from *CompassPoint*, paid for by a special grant we have for this purpose. We will be recruiting for the Task Force over the next few months and look forward to its recommendations for how we can improve. (See article, page 2, on task force in this newsletter.)

I look forward to working with Juan, the staff, Board and the entire Pacific Center community over the coming year. 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## **Pacific Center Youth Speaks at 'Out in Oakland'**

Stepping towards the microphone outside of Oakland's city hall with a hundred person crowd gazing upon him, Pacific Center youth participant Carlos shared his reflections on the reality of living as an openly gay teenager in the Bay Area. After thanking his parents who attended the Oakland gathering to support him, he talked about being an outspoken advocate for LGBT issues through our Pacific Center youth program and at his school. By challenging anti-gay harassment and homophobia in his every day life, he is finding his power in helping others and improving our community. While never easy, he understands and embraces that for positive change to happen in his life, he must step up and help lead the way.

Carlos shared one particular story where he was afraid to come out at a leadership in government camp for young men. After witnessing several homophobic comments and acts, he realized he needed to come out as a gay person so that his peers could understand the reality of their prejudice. His eloquent description of openly declaring his sexual identity at a large gathering showcased the amazing strength of today's LGBT youth and the impact a youth program like ours can have on preparing young people for these moments.
