## From Board President Katharine Gale

Many of us know about the Pacific Center because it was here for us when we had a specific need. Some of us come to the Center on a regular basis, while others of us only pass through from time to time. But few of us know about all of the things that actually go on at the Center. So, I'd like to share with you some of the remarkable things that happened at the Pacific Center just this past month.

On a Wednesday afternoon, one of our mental health interns took a call from a man threatening to hurt himself. After nearly an hour on the phone, our intern successfully got him to safety.

On a Friday evening, eight youth between 14 and 18 years old came to the Pacific Center for the first time as part of our youth outreach efforts and found a welcoming space and a program for them.

On a Wednesday night, 15 married and formerly married men met in a peer group to give and get support. That same evening, 15 bisexual women also met at the Center and found friendship, support, and caring.

On a Tuesday morning, our Clinic Director was called to a local school where a young person had just come out and needed help. She worked with the young person, other students, and staff to make the process a little bit easier.

On a Saturday afternoon, our Executive Director met with LGBT leaders from Lambda Legal, GLAAD, Gay Men's Health Crisis, Los Angeles Gay & Lesbian Community Center, and 26 other LGBT organizations from around the country to talk about the equality movement of our LGBT community.

On a Monday evening, one of our mental health interns helped a newly HIV-diagnosed man cope with the news and prepare to tell his partner.

On a Thursday night, 12 women met at the *Lesbians of Color* peer support group and created a safe space for support, connecting, and socializing. At the same time, nearly 40 guys met through a joint meeting of *Express 20's* and the San Francisco social group, *Out & About*.

All of these activities and many others find a home at the Pacific Center. There is no other organization that offers the same range of support and service to our community. I am proud of the meaningful, challenging, and sometimes life-saving work that the Pacific Center does. We do it because you care enough to support us. I know the East Bay is a better place to live because the Center is here. Thank you!

## Youth Program

Last week, four *Youth Advocates* and I walked into an East Oakland school to speak with thirty students and their teachers about being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, or intersexed (LGBTQI). To help educate the broader community about the lives and experiences of proud LGBTQI youth, our trained *Youth Advocates* tell their coming out stories and share personal anecdotes.

The first speaker starts by sharing that she's been working with the Pacific Center's *LOUD Youth Program* on and off for about four years. She's straightforward in her manner and speech. She ends by saying to the class very simply and unapologetically, "I am who I am."

The second speaker talks about how he has had a fairly easy time being himself in his gay identity, and knows that's not the case for many youth. He speaks candidly and with the passion that has fueled his personal dedication to LGBTQI youth equality for the past five years.

The third Youth Advocate starts with a bold confidence, which doesn't reveal the fact that this is only her third time speaking on a Pacific Center panel. She talks about growing up in Oakland and how coming out was not an option until she left home. She talks about how she always knew she was a lesbian, but couldn't admit it to herself or her family out of fear, and how much pain that had caused her. She says her culture nor her religion typically accept LGBTQI people, but now that she's out she knows she's healthier and happier than when she had to hide.

The final Youth Advocate steps up. This youth is the most seasoned speaker and tells her story seamlessly, with well crafted pauses, jokes and difficult memories. She always starts with, "I came out to myself when I was fifteen." She talks about the agony of coming out to a parent, the contrasting support she's found at the Pacific Center's *LOUD Youth Program*, and the need to support other LGBTQI youth by doing panels like this one.

The Youth Advocates then take on many of the audience's questions after the applause dies down. "How can someone be both LGBTQ and religious?" "Is being LGBTQ a choice?" "Why do some people call themselves Queer?" "How do you know?" It's in the question and answer period that each Youth Advoc-

## Mental Health Clinic Update

The Mental Health Clinic at the Pacific Center continues to be a vital part of the Center and the services provided are vital to our community. Whether it's an LGBTQ individual needing support or a couple facing issues in their relationship, the intern staff in the Clinic are here to address the mental health needs of our community by providing individual, couple, group, or family therapy.

Being in the Bay Area, with such a large and visible LGBTQ community, we sometimes forget how frequently members of our community feel alone and isolated. Sometimes, just having someone to talk to can make such a difference in how we reach out to others or in the choices we make. It's very clear that having the Clinic here to address the needs of our community is such an important community resource.

Clients from all over the East Bay express appreciation for having a Mental Health Clinic specific to the needs of the LGBTQ community. The goal of the Pacific Center is to provide a safe and caring environment for all members of our community—a place where there is safety for and in our unique identities. The Clinic supports that goal. We offer mental health services that allow community members to explore whatever issues are important to them and with therapists who respect them and understand the effects of homophobia/heterosexism on their physical and emotional well-being.

Whether it's looking at issues with relationships, exploring ways to better manage feelings of depression or anxiety, or breaking through the isolation brought on by homophobia, HIV, or perhaps just being new to the area, the support from therapists and/or others in therapy groups can make such a difference in one's life. It is with that knowledge that the staff, interns, and the volunteer therapists providing supervision make their commitment to the Clinic. Our goal is to provide quality, accessible mental health services to our community while providing excellent training to therapists who will be serving our community for years to come.

## HIV Services at Pacific Center

The Pacific Center's HIV Program offers a number of helpful services for positive gay, bisexual and queer men who reside in both Alameda and Contra Costa counties. Individual psychotherapy, as well as the *Positive* psychotherapy group are offered on a weekly basis. Fees are based on a sliding scale, and Medical is accepted in most cases. *Positive Direction Workshops* are a collaboration between the PC and EBAC (East Bay AIDS Center). These workshops are free, and provide useful information on a variety of topics to those affected by HIV. Interns in the PC Mental Health Program also conduct free short-term counseling for EBAC patients at that facility. The *Mr. Sex Clinical Outreach* program at the Steamworks, which began in the September of 2003, continues to take place on Friday evenings. This program which is a joint effort between the Pacific Center, Steamworks, and The City of Berkeley Health Department, offers patrons of the bathhouse with opportunity to speak with a psychotherapist on a variety of issues including HIV/STD risk reduction, substance abuse, depression, anxiety, relationships, and of course, sex.

The dedicated staff at the Pacific Center are looking forward to exciting changes within the HIV Program that will take place throughout 2006. These changes will include a new name for the program that will more accurately reflect the times, a new Pacific Center website, and exciting social events that well help positive men in the East Bay to connect and support one another.
